A. CALL TO ORDER & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

B. ROLL CALL

Mayor Frank noted there was a quorum with Councilors Hildebrandt Mackin, and Maguire present in person and Councilor Sandoval-Perez present via Zoom. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

C. CONSENT AGENDA

1. Approval of June 3, 2024, City Council Regular Session Minutes

KITTY MACKIN MOVED TO APPROVE THE CONSENT AGENDA WITH THE REGULAR SESSION MINUTES OF JUNE 3, 2024. SECONDED BY DREW HILDEBRANDT.

Motion Carried with Frank, Hildebrandt, Mackin, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voting aye. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

D. ACTION ITEMS

1. Dayton Village Affordable Housing Project - Purchase Offer Transaction Date

Dave Rucklos, Tourism and Economic Development Director invited Teresa Smith from Community Home Builders to present.

Teresa Smith stated that CHB receives funds from the Federal Government for 502 Loans, but there aren't any funds left this year. The Federal Government receives funds in October and availability to the organization would be in December.

DREW HILDEBRANT MOVED TO EXTEND THE CLOSING OF THE DAYTON VILLAGE TRANSACTION WITH COMMUNITY HOME BUILDERS TO A DATE NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 31, 2024. SECONDED BY KITTY MACKIN. Motion Carried with Frank, Hildebrandt, Mackin, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voting aye. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

2. Dayton Fireworks Donation Request

Chris Teichroew, 663 Warmcombe Dr., Dayton, Vice Chair of the Dayton Fireworks Committee requested a donation of \$5,000 to the City Council with the plan to continue fundraising and not have to request this donation again.

KITTY MACKIN MOVED TO APPROVE THE DONATION OF \$5,000 TO THE DAYTON FIREWORKS COMMITTEE. SECONDED BY DREW HILDEBRANDT. Motion Carried with Frank, Hildebrandt, Mackin, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voting aye. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

3. Performing Arts of Dayton Donation Request

Robin Pederson, 202 7th St., Dayton, PAD representative presented on the plans for Fiddles, Fruit, and Fungi Festival on September 21, 2024. She requested the rental fees to the Courthouse Square Park and the Community Center waived and for a \$800 donation.

DREW HILDEBRANDT MOVED TO APPROVE THE \$800 DONATION WITH THE FEES WAIVED TO THE COURTHOUSE SQUARE PARK AND COMMUNITY CENTER. SECONDED BY KITTY MACKIN. Motion Carried with Frank, Hildebrandt, Mackin, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voting aye. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

4. Appointment of New Councilor

Candidates for the vacant Councilor seat Scott Hover, Gerald Wayne Stock, and Chris Teichroew were present. Colt Wilkins was absent.

The City Council interviewed the candidates present on their background, public safety, growth for Dayton, and inclusivity.

The role of the City Council was explained to the candidates.

Jim Maguire nominated Chris Teichroew for the vacancy.

Drew Hildebrandt nominated Scott Hover for the vacancy.

Councilor Mackin abstained from voting.

Frank and Maguire voted aye for Chris Teichroew. Hildebrandt and Sandoval-Perez voted nay for Chris Teichroew.

Frank, Hildebrandt, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voted aye for Scott Hover.

Scott Hover was appointed to the vacancy.

Scott Hover was sworn into office as Councilor for the City of Dayton.

5. Approval of Resolution 23/24-18 Change the US Bank Signing Authority

With the changes in council and staff the authorized signers need to be updated with the bank. Councilor Maguire requested to remove his name from the signing authority. Councilor Mackin volunteered to be added to the signing authority, since she lives in town.

SECONDED BY JIM MAGUIRE. Motion Carried with Frank, Hildebrandt, Hover, Mackin, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voting aye. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

11. Approval of Resolution 23/24-24 Dayton Fee Schedule Update to include EV Charging Station Hourly Use Fee

Dave Rucklos, TED Director presented the resolution to amend the Dayton Fee Schedule. He stated that the \$1.50/hr. rate is reasonable to balance the cost to the City per kilowatt hour for the electricity used to charge EVs.

DREW HILDEBRANDT MOVED TO APPROVE RESOLUTION 23/24-24, A RESOLUTION AMENDING THE CITY OF DAYTON FEE SCHEDULE TO ADD AN EV CHARGING STATION FEE OF \$1.50/HOUR AT COURTHOUSE SQUARE PARK. SECONDED BY KITTY MACKIN. Motion Carried with Frank, Hildebrandt, Hover, Mackin, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voting aye. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

12. Approval of Resolution 23/24-25 IGA with ODOT for Dayton TSP Updates

The City was awarded a grant from the Transportation and Growth Management Program, a joint program between Oregon Department of Land Conservation (DLCD) and Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) to update the City Transportation System Plan. The city will provide staff time to match the grant.

KITTY MACKIN MOVED TO APPROVE RESOLUTION 23/24-25, A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE OREGON DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AND THE CITY OF DAYTON FOR UPDATES TO THE

TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM PLAN. SECONDED BY SCOTT HOVER. Motion Carried with Frank, Hildebrandt, Hover, Mackin, Maguire, and Sandoval-Perez voting aye. Council President Wildhaber was absent.

Date: July 15, 2024

Background Information:

Each year the City Council reviews the recommendations of the City Manager for a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for the upcoming year.

For the last eight years, the Council has used the Portland CPI-W–Size Class B/C wage earner index as a guide in determining the COLA offered to employees. The CPI-W index averaged over the first 5 months of 2024 is 3.42%. (See attached Consumer Price Index). The FY 2024-2025 adopted budget included a 5% COLA for all employees.

Carlton and Dundee are two non-bargaining Cities in Yamhill County and they have approved or recommended the following COLA for FY24-25:

Carlton	3.2%
Dundee	5.0%

In addition to daily responsibilities, the city continues to have a large list of projects including infrastructure, maintenance, and technology updates that require additional staff time and resources to complete. Each one of our dedicated staff members wears several hats to maintain a high level of quality of our services, and to perform the variety of tasks that are a part of each of the positions in which they serve.

City Manager Recommendation: I recommend the City Council approve a cost-of-living adjustment in line with the Portland CPI-W index and an average of increases of other cities in Yamhill County and provide City staff with a 4.0% cost of living adjustment.

Potential Motion Verbiage: “I move to approve a 4.0% cost of living adjustment for city staff effective July 1, 2024.”

City Council Options:

- 1 – Move to approve a 4.0% COLA.
- 2 – Move to approve a COLA at a different percentage.
- 3 – Do not approve a COLA.

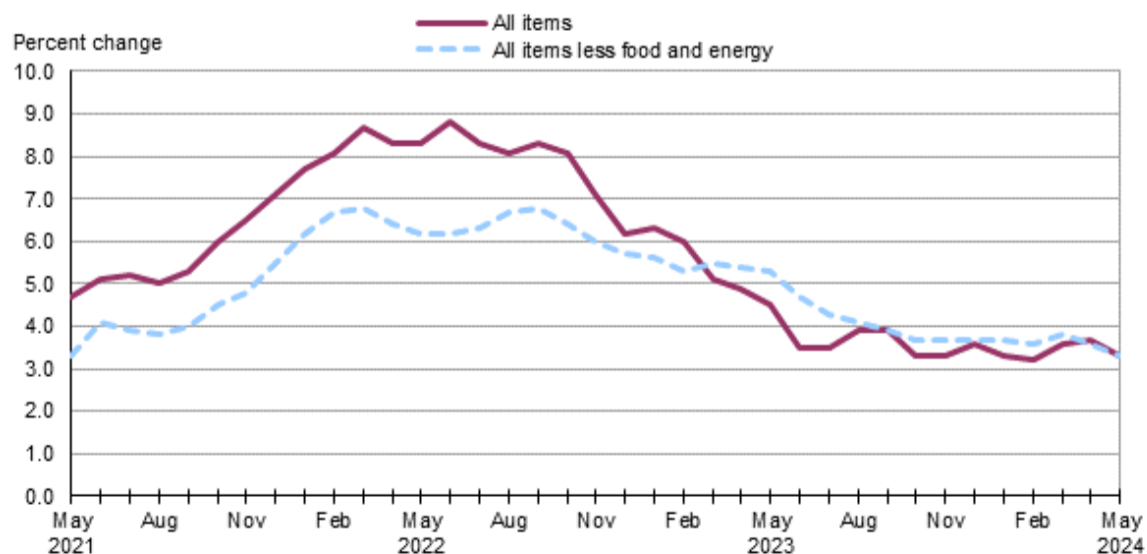
Consumer Price Index, West Region — May 2024

Area prices were up 0.1 percent over the past month, up 3.3 percent from a year ago

Prices in the West Region, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), advanced 0.1 percent in May, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. (See [table A](#).) The May increase was influenced by higher prices for shelter. (Data in this report are not seasonally adjusted. Accordingly, month-to-month changes may reflect seasonal influences.)

Over the last 12 months, the CPI-U increased 3.3 percent. (See [chart 1](#) and [table A](#).) Food prices rose 2.7 percent. Energy prices advanced 5.4 percent, largely the result of an increase in the price of electricity. The index for all items less food and energy advanced 3.3 percent over the year. (See [table 1](#).)

Food

Food prices rose 0.3 percent for the month of May. (See [table 1](#).) Prices for food at home increased 0.3 percent, with higher prices in three of the six grocery categories. Prices for food away from home increased 0.3 percent for the same period.

Over the year, food prices rose 2.7 percent. Prices for food at home increased 1.9 percent since a year ago, led by higher prices for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs (3.7 percent). Overall, prices rose in five of the six grocery categories. Prices for food away from home increased 4.2 percent.

Energy

The energy index fell 0.6 percent over the month. The decrease was mainly due to lower prices for gasoline (-2.2 percent). Prices for natural gas service increased 4.2 percent, and prices for electricity advanced 1.0 percent for the same period.

Energy prices advanced 5.4 percent over the year, largely due to higher prices for electricity (10.0 percent). Prices paid for natural gas service increased 5.1 percent, and prices for gasoline advanced 3.1 percent during the past year.

All items less food and energy

The index for all items less food and energy rose 0.1 percent in May. Higher prices for medical care (0.6 percent) and shelter (0.2 percent) were partially offset by lower prices for apparel (-1.2 percent) and recreation (-0.6 percent).

Over the year, the index for all items less food and energy advanced 3.3 percent. Components contributing to the increase included shelter (4.6 percent) and medical care (4.4 percent). Partly offsetting the increases were price decreases in new and used motor vehicles (-3.3 percent) and apparel (-2.0 percent).

The June 2024 Consumer Price Index for the West Region is scheduled to be released on July 11, 2024.

Technical Note

The Consumer Price Index for the West Region is published monthly. The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 93 percent of the total U.S. population and (2) a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers approximately 29 percent of the total U.S. population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Each month, prices are collected in 75 urban areas across the country from about 6,000 housing units and approximately 22,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date; for most of the CPI-U the reference base is 1982-84 equals 100. An increase of 7 percent from the reference base, for example, is shown as 107.000. Alternatively, that relationship can also be expressed as the price of a base period market basket of goods and services rising from \$100 to \$107. For further details see the CPI home page on the internet at www.bls.gov/cpi and the CPI section of the BLS Handbook of Methods available on the internet at www.bls.gov/opub/hom/cpi/.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights that represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Because the sample size of a local area is smaller, the local area index is subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal influences. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. **NOTE: Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices between cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.**

The West Region covered in this release is comprised of the following thirteen states: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.









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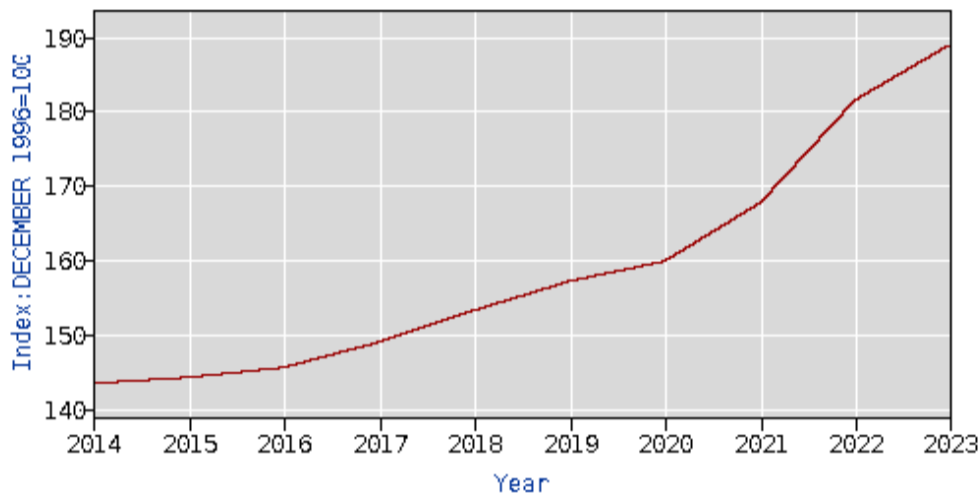

Date: July 15, 2024

History/Background

Due to the increasing demands on my time with various projects, including providing technology support to city employees, the implementation of our online permitting and application system, and the city's new app, former City Manager Rochelle Roaden suggested that we hire a part time Library Assistant for 15 hours a week. The intent of this hiring was to increase library access for our community by allowing the library to have staff for regular morning hours.

Ms. Roaden asked Vicki Durand, a retiree of the City, if she would be interested in working in the library as she is already a volunteer. Ms. Durand agreed and was to begin working for the library in June 2024.

Due to budgetary realities, we learned in late May that there would be no funds available to hire Ms. Durand after all.

In speaking with the City's accountant, I have confirmed that while I am serving in the role of Interim City Manager, the funds budgeted for my salary as Library Director are not being utilized. This began on June 13, 2024, and will continue until a new City Manager is hired and begins serving in that role. As such, the budget situation for library personnel has changed, and the funds are available to hire a Library Assistant for 15 hours per week.

Under the City of Dayton Charter Section 34(g), an Interim City Manager may not appoint staff without City Council approval.

Interim City Manager Recommendation: I recommend that the City Council approve the appointment of Vicki Durand as Office Specialist I, Step 1, with the working title of Library Assistant, effective August 19, 2024.

Potential Motion Verbiage: "I move to approve the appointment of Vicki Durand as Office Specialist I at Step 1 on the salary scale for 15 hours per week, effective August 19, 2024."

City Council Options:

- 1 – Move to approve appointing Vicki Durand as Office Specialist I as above.
- 2 – Move to approve appointing Vicki Durand to a different position or salary step.
- 3 – Do not approve the appointment of Vicki Durand.

Today, the United States Supreme Court issued its decision in [Grants Pass v. Johnson](#), a case that has been closely followed by local governments on the west coast and across the country. The issue before the court was whether the enforcement of generally applicable laws regulating camping on public property constitutes “cruel and unusual punishment” prohibited by the Eighth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The court, in a 6-3 decision, concluded along ideological grounds that such laws do not violate the Eighth Amendment.

Previous decisions by lower courts held that such camping laws violate the Eighth Amendment because, when enforced against individuals experiencing homelessness, they criminalize an individual’s status as homeless if there are not enough shelter beds to accommodate the individual. The Supreme Court disagreed with this conclusion, deciding that “public-camping laws prohibit actions undertaken by any person, regardless of status. It makes no difference whether the charged defendant is currently a person experiencing homelessness, a backpacker on vacation, or a student who abandons his dorm room to camp out in protest on the

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The majority decision also recognized that the issue of homelessness is complex. The Court acknowledged its causes are many, as are the public policy responses required to address homelessness. The Court concluded that allowing a handful of judges to address such a complex issue is not required by the Eighth Amendment, but rather such issues should be addressed by elected officials and the communities they represent.

While no doubt an important decision for local governments, here in Oregon the practical effect of today's *Grants Pass* decision will not be significant. As most local governments are aware, in 2021 the Oregon Legislature enacted [HB 3115](#) (ORS 195.530), which requires any city or county law that regulates the acts of sitting, lying, sleeping or keeping warm and dry outdoors on public property that is open to the public to be objectively reasonable as to time, place and manner with regard to persons experiencing homelessness. This bill statutorily codified some of the rights established by the *Grants Pass* line of cases, and to that end, local governments in Oregon must still comply with the basic premises of the previous decisions despite today's ruling by the Supreme Court.

Most local jurisdictions have updated their local camping ordinance to be in compliance with HB 3115. If you have not, or would like to review your ordinance in light of today's Supreme Court decision, please do not hesitate to contact our office for assistance.

CAMPSITE FOR UNHOUSED PERSONS DEACTIVATED STARTING 07/03/2024

(NEWBERG, OR) – The City of Newberg is deactivating its temporary campsite for unhoused persons effective Wednesday, July 3rd, 2024. The activation of the campsite near Sportsman’s Airpark was necessitated by the news that the Community Wellness Collective temporary church shelter was due to cease operations at the end of June. The city would like to thank CWC for its efforts to date to shelter unhoused persons through the winter.

The decision to cease campsite operations is based upon two factors.

First, there has recently been a change in the legal framework with the Supreme Court striking down the Grants Pass decision¹ as being out of alignment with the substance of the eighth amendment of the Constitution. This legal change was also weighed in the decision to shut down the temporary campsite.

Secondly and more importantly the NDPD Police Chief has been able to clarify the method by which officers can help induct individuals experiencing homelessness into the YCAP shelter on College Street, and that shelter is now operating. A dialog with YCAP has also recently revealed that there will be additional shelter options from YCAP, including sheltering in a local motel. Our police officers will therefore be able to help individuals experiencing homelessness to enter YCAP’s navigation system.

Please accept my sincere gratitude for your generous donation. Homeward Bound Pets Humane Society is celebrating 49 years as Oregon's first no-kill shelter; we're honored to serve the abused, neglected, and homeless animals arriving at our door daily. Many of these poor animals need medical or emotional support before they're ready to be adopted; which leads to long stays, an overflowing shelter, and increased costs as we provide care and find their new homes. Our small staff and volunteer team did everything they could to ensure each animal felt safe, comfortable, and loved while we changed their story by adding a happy ending as we searched for their forever families.

In 2023, we provided 10,687 services to dogs and cats, including spay/neuter surgeries, shelter care, reuniting lost dogs, administering vaccines and microchips, along with issuing licenses to help lost pets return to their families. Open since 2017, our spay/neuter clinic has performed over nearly 18,000 surgeries! Last year, 345 dogs and cats arrived at our shelter, many in great distress. Both our online thrift shop and physical store sell unique treasures with proceeds supporting our work - over 50 tons of resellable items were kept out of local landfills last year alone. Agee, a survivor of cruelty, was rescued from the side of the road, having suffered two dislocated hips, among other injuries. Our team quickly provided the urgent medical care she needed which was followed by months of kennel rest and TLC. She's made progress in trusting humans, but remains wary of fast movements and loud noises. She would love a home with outdoor views and climbing spots; do you know the perfect home for her?

I am very pleased to share that progress continues on our shelter grounds as we prepare for the new, state-of-the-art facility which will be a safe refuge for our animals. A water line, power pole and fire hydrant have been installed, along with temporary trailers for staff offices and temporary catteries.
